Dear All

This New Year has started with a lot of quiet activity taking place. We have a **new logo**, and one that we think represents Wivenhoe much more. It shows St Mary's Church with its distinctive cupola, and is the building in which we have now held three public lectures, and then in the foreground a traditional sailing smack highlighting the river without which Wivenhoe would not be the place it is today. Fortunately there are still a few of these fine vessels around where once there were many.

In January, the **Wivenhoe History Archive Project** started with a team of 9 people having two days of training sessions with Jack Latimer of Community Sites whose software we are using to create our new community archive. All very exciting. It is now a case of which this space; we are now working to build lots of new pages in anticipation we can launch this web site in a couple of months' time. This will just be the start of course. We are now meeting every Friday morning at my house to add pages, photographs, oral recordings and anything that tells of Wivenhoe's rich history. The archive will focus heavily on WW1 as some of the £9,000 grant we received from the Heritage Lottery Fund has gone towards completing our fund-raising to pay for this software so that we have somewhere to lodge and show what has been achieved from our WW1 project.

The **WW1 Project** has been making progress on several fronts – bit like the War itself. Wivenhoe's Junior schools were very keen to be involved during the September term whilst there was lots of publicity nationally to make the centenary of the outbreak of hostilities in August 2014. However things move on and we are now having to find different ways to engage with them. Gill Strudwick is leading the team and doing a good job of it too. They are planning to have special displays at John Stewart's Wivenhoe Memories exhibition in the Wm Loveless Hall which will run for the three days over Easter – 4th – 6th April from 10am – 6pm each day.

We have so far enjoyed **one meeting this year** with guest speaker Dr Herbert Eiden, who gave us a fascinating talk about the Victoria County of Essex (see the report on it by Christopher Thompson). We have already had one outing which was to the **Essex Regiment Museum** for some WW1 research, although it proved to be a very enjoyable visit and a place worth visiting if ever you are in Chelmsford. More trips are planned for later this year. Details are given later in this newsletter.

I look forward to seeing everyone at the **next meeting on Wednesday 11th March at 7.30pm** in the Scout & Guide Hall at which **Bernie Hetherington** will be our guest speaker to talk about the significance of Captain Nottage to Wivenhoe's last 100 years. It will also be our AGM and we will have a few small items to vote on. As ever non-members will be very welcome at the meeting.

Dr Herbert Eiden on The Victoria County History of Essex

Our group had the chance to hear Herbert Eiden, who lives in Wivenhoe, talk about the history and work of the **VCH** as it is universally known last Wednesday. He explained how, from its late-Victorian and private origins, it had become the main guide to local history across England during the twentieth century.

He was also able to cover how its format had changed during the period since then and the way in which it covered the history of parishes and places like Wivenhoe.

Sadly, financial pressures had curtailed its work and it was now being conducted on the basis of voluntary donations and the work of local groups in places like Newport and Great and Little Holland.

Historians did have a lot to gain from detailed local knowledge given by the inhabitants of such places but he could not hold out too much hope of the county being fully covered in the near future. Fortunately Wivenhoe has already been covered by the VCH. All in all, a very interesting afternoon.

Future Trips

To the Imperial War Museum on Saturday 7th March. Anyone interested in going should contact Ian Valentine.

To Tilbury Fort, West Tilbury (where Queen Elizabeth's great speech in 1588, the year of the Armada was given), **Coalhouse Fort at East Tilbury** where General Gordon was commander in the 1860s) and **Saffron Gardens at Horndon-on-the Hill** (where Queen Elizabeth stayed) **on Sunday 14th June**.

To Languard Fort near Felixtowe on Sunday 9th August to see the development of its fortifications from the early modern period to recent times.

Essex Record Office

There is some disturbing recent news from County Hall in Chelmsford. The hours for which the Essex Record Office will be open from April are being seriously cut.

The ERO will no longer be open at all on Mondays and only on two Saturdays each month. Fewer people are apparently visiting its research rooms in Wharf Road while more people are using on-line facilities. This is bad news. We hope it is not the thin end of the wedge leading eventually to the ERO's closure. There were rumours several years ago that closure was being considered by the County Council to save money. If any politician or bureaucrat is thinking along these lines, they should forget it: the ERO is the one part of the County Council that is known worldwide. Cutting the time for which it is open or closing it would be self-defeating.
