October 11th talk in St Mary's Church

We held our first public talk in our parish church on Friday, 11th October, given by Chris Thompson, one of our Group's founding members.



On a cold, wet night, over 120 people came to hear about the fortunes of the de Vere and Howard families in the period of the

Wars of the Roses. We also heard about Wivenhoe Hall, which was one of the largest, if not the largest, late medieval house in Essex. It must have been larger than Layer Marney Towers and lay

between the High Street, de Vere Lane and the KGV Playing Field. The survival of the accounts of the 1st Duke of Norfolk and of the 13th Earl of Oxford mean we know some things about life in the Hall in its heyday.



Chris Thompson's research into the records of Wivenhoe Hall revealed that around 1485 a bricklayer called John Perrekyn from Mile End agreed to make 80,000 bricks in a kiln here subject to then owner, the Duke of Norfolk, providing the necessary wood, sand and straw. This would have been for a major extension as the building of the Hall was first started in the 1440s. Sadly not much of the original building survived past about 1625.

Visit to Broomfield Hall, Felsted Old School and Leez Priory

On a rather damp Thursday, the 19th of September, a small group of us went exploring a part of Essex that none of us were every familiar with. Led by Chris Thompson, who regaled us with his considerable knowledge of the Rich family, we went first to Broomfield Hall, just north of Chelmsford, which the Rich family acquired around 1541. The Rich family were indeed rich owning many other grand properties in Essex including Leez Priory. Lord Rich founded the old school in Felsted and was buried in Felsted Church upon his death in 1567.
